

# The Connection Between Public Health and Mental Health

- ➤ Public health is the art and science of protecting and improving the health of people, by assuring the conditions in which they can be healthy
  - ➤ We do this by:
    - ✓ Using data and evidence
    - Awareness and creativity
    - Assuring physical health, mental health, community health and well-being
- ➤ Mental health is a person's condition with regard to their psychological and emotional well-being





# The Impact of COVID-19 on Health and Mental Health

- Health, social and economic impacts
  - Mental health widely impacted
- Worsened or caused serious illness (i.e. long-COVID)
- Psychological distress
  - symptoms of depression, anxiety or post-traumatic stress especially health care workers.
- Some affected more:
  - Young adults extended school or university closures, vulnerable to social isolation and disconnection, raising feelings of anxiety, uncertainty, loneliness
  - Children and adolescents increased risk of family stress or abuse, feelings of isolation related to school closures
  - Adult Women-reporting that 45% of women experienced violence, either directly or indirectly during the first year of the pandemic. (from WHO)




#### The Impact of COVID-19 on Mental Health and Substance Abuse

- Mental health needs services disrupted. The pandemic, staff and infrastructure were often diverted to COVID-19 relief. Social measures and care. Poor knowledge and misinformation about the virus drove fears and worries that stopped people from seeking help. (from WHO)
- Compared to 1 in 10 adults in 2019, 4 in 10 American adults have reported symptoms
  of anxiety or depression throughout the course of the pandemic.
- Given that up to 50% of those with substance use disorders (SUDs) experience symptoms of mental illness, reports of substance abuse have been on the rise as well.

OUNTY What Are Opioids?


- A group of substances that act on opioid receptors. Most often used for pain control; also used for diarrhea control, cough suppression, and replacement therapy for opioid use disorder.
- Naturally occurring in the poppy plant, can also be synthetically produced.
- Examples include:
  - ✓ Heroin
  - Fentanyl
  - Oxycodone (OxyContin®)
  - Hydrocodone (Vicodin®)
  - Codeine (Captain Cody, Lean, Schoolboy, Pancakes and Syrup)
  - Morphine, and many others





# What is Substance Use Disorder (SUD)?

Substance use disorders occur when the recurrent use of alcohol and/or drugs causes clinically significant impairment, affects a person's brain, including health problems, disability, and failure to meet major responsibilities at work, school, or home. (SAMHSA)





### **Treatments for SUD**

- Behavioral counseling
- Medication


- Medical devices to treat withdrawal symptoms
- > Evaluation/treatment for depression and anxiety
- Long-term follow-up to prevent relapse







# World's Powerful Countries Gross domestic product (GDP)







Death rate from opioid overdoses, 1990 to 2019 Death rates from opioid use disorders are measured as the number of deaths per 100,000 individuals







Prevention Education (Delphi Rise, Council on Alcoholism of the Finger Lakes, Wayne County Public Health)	Education for prevention
Narcan/Naloxone education and distribution	Prevention of fatal overdose






