# **Black History Month**

February 2023

Like many of our traditions, Black History Month came from the necessity of African Americans and African descentants across the African diaspora to learn and acknowledge their history beyond slavery and promote their modern-day accomplishments. In 1915, Carter G. Woodson and Jesse E. Moorland founded the Association for the Study of Negro Life and History, now known as the Association for the Study of African American Life and History (ASALH). In 1924, the ASALH founded and sponsored "Negro History Week," celebrated on the second week of February. By the 1960s, many colleges began to celebrate Black History Month, and in 1976, President Gerald Ford officially recognized February as Black History Month. The 2023 Black History Month theme is "Black Resistance."

# Fellow Spotlight!

My name is Ashraful Islam Rony, and I am originally from Bangladesh. I came to this beautiful country in the year 2018. I got my MPH from the University at Buffalo with a focus on epidemiology in May 2021. My Fellowship placement is at the Rural Outreach Center in East Aurora, New York. We are a team of four Fellows researching generational poverty in Southwestern New York. We have created a community health survey for use in the five counties of Southwestern New York (Erie, Chautauqua, Alleghany, Cattaraugus, and Wyoming counties). Our survey aims to identify health disparities in rural areas and the factors contributing to them. We hope the survey results will assist us in ensuring that local policy decisions are based on local data. Our accomplishments so far include the development of a survey for residents in Western New York and establishing contact with various community members. We also participate in and organize community events, community conversations and visit other community establishments to discuss our projects and collect survey responses.

Additionally, we analyze data from collected responses to understand the specific requirements of rural Western New York communities; we are creating educational materials for distribution in the rural areas of Southwestern New York. As a Fellow, I have assisted the Erie County Department of Health in hosting a vaccination clinic for the Bangladeshi population. Currently, I'm working with the cancer department team at the Erie County Department of Health to create flyers, videos, and in-person trainings to increase cancer awareness in the Bangladeshi community.

# Teen Dating Violence Awareness Month (TDVAM)

February is also Teen Dating Violence Awareness Month. When most people think about domestic violence, they often think of adult relationships and familial relationships, but teen dating violence is a quiet yet huge problem among our youth. Nearly 1.5 million high school students (of all gender identities) nationwide experience physical abuse from a dating partner in a single year. For many reasons, our teens may not come to us when things like this happen, making it so much more critical for trusted adults, peers, community members, and school staff to recognize the signs of abuse and where to find resources.

## **Facts about Teen Dating Violence**

- · One in three girls in the US is a victim of physical, emotional, or verbal abuse from a Is your child: dating partner, a figure that far exceeds rates of other types of youth violence.
- Half of the youth who have been victims of dating violence and rape attempt suicide. compared to 12.5% of non-abused girls and 5.4% of non-abused boys.
- Eighty-one (81) percent of parents believe teen dating violence is not an issue or admit they don't know if it's an issue.
- College students are not equipped to deal with dating abuse – 57% say it is difficult to identify, and 58% say they don't know how to help someone experiencing it.



# Signs of Teen Dating Violence

- More withdrawn than usual, or exhibiting changes to their personality?
- Spending less time with friends and family and more time with their partner?
- Spending less time doing things they previously loved doing?
- Frequently preoccupied with their relationship?
- Exhibiting cuts or bruises?
- Starting to excessively apologize or being more self-critical?
- Making excuses for their partner's bad behavior or things they say?

## Is their partner:

- Excessively texting, calling, or messaging them on social media?
- Demanding to know where they are, who they are with, and what they are doing?
- Putting your child down or making them feel bad about something?

- Do not have health insurance
- Have health insurance with a cost share that may prevent a person from obtaining screening and/or diagnostic services
- Meet income eligibility requirements
- Meet age requirements

Kate oversees Emergency Preparedness, Community Health Assessment/Community Health Improvement Plan (CHA/CHIP), COVID-recovery, and Epidemiology/Data Fellows housed within the department. Since joining forces with NYSPHC in early 2022, Ontario County has been able to hire two of its Fellows as full-time employees due to an unexpected vacancy and a retirement. Ontario County has been a pivotal force in establishing the Mentorship component of the NYSPHC Fellowship Program and has paved the way for many other Counties to follow. Working alongside Kate is Margarita Sumeguin, the Ontario County Local Coordinator. Kate and Margarita address the needs of their Fellows as a team and expose them to experiences that will contribute to their growth. Participating in the Fellowship Program (and having excellent Fellows!) has allowed Kate and her staff the opportunity to develop and mentor new Public Health practitioners, fill vacancies, pursue innovation, and increase the department's reach in the community. Kate also participates in the NYSPHC Local Health Department workgroup, where she brings her experience, knowledge, and support to foster vital collaborations for the NYSPHC Ontario County Fellows.


