

Fellows across the Schenectady and Albany Region have made huge steps in addressing period poverty across the Capital District! The group, led by Representatives Claire Jennings, Annabelle Rieseler, and Brynn Watkins, established the first period pantry at Bethesda House in Schenectady and has been rapidly expanding their pantry boxes around the Capital District. The period pantry, made of a refurbished newspaper vending machine painted pink, includes products such as pads, liners, and tampons. Brown paper bags are also provided for individuals to carry the products, and menstrual cups and period underwear will be available in the future. The group believes that menstrual hygiene products should be free for everyone, as they are not covered by WIC benefits or SNAP benefits. Great work, Fellows!

Hannah Matthews is a Public Health Fellow with the Division of Epidemiology and Public Health Planning at the Orange County Department of Health and has been heavily involved in both the data collection and writing process for the county's Community Health Assessment (CHA). Hannah will be attending the 2023 Council of State and Territorial Epidemiologists (CSTE) conference in Salt Lake City, Utah, to present her abstract: "One Size Doesn't Fit All: Aggregate Data Mask Differences in Perceived Community Needs from Urban, Suburban, and Rural Communities in Orange County, NY." The study explored the application of the U.S. Department of Agriculture's rural-urban commuting area codes to investigate differences in perceived community needs based on population density, which contributed to the selection of priority areas in Orange County's 2022-2024 CHA and Community Health Improvement Plan (CHIP). This analysis provides a model for using geographic units of analysis to identify trends and inform priority area selection and public health resource allocation.

Non-Fellow Spotlight!

David E. Bell, Ph.D. MPH is the Emergency Preparedness Coordinator for the Genesee and Orleans County Health Departments (GO Health). At the height of the COVID-19 response, he supervised four temporary county positions dedicated to assisting response activities, including mass vaccination and testing operations. When the NYSPHC Fellowship Program became available, these temporary positions quickly transitioned to become the first GO Health NYSPHC Fellows, helping lead the ongoing local public health response to the pandemic. David, alongside Cora Young as the GO Health Emergency Preparedness Educator and Jennifer Rowan as the GO Health NYSPHC Local Coordinator, has had the privilege of leading an exceptionally talented group of Fellows dedicated to the safety and well-being of local communities during many critical times of the COVID-19 pandemic. As demand for immunization and testing declined, two Fellows have continued with David to help him rebuild traditional planning components of the Emergency Preparedness program. In contrast, other Fellows began to take on new duties with other supervisors, including routine immunizations, wastewater analysis, public health education, and accreditation planning. David finds the opportunity to work with Fellows as a chance to build on the ideals of public health: fostering collaboration, interagency bridges, greater workforce training, and new or improved public health services where they are most needed. GO Health Fellows have become foundational for making a difference when and where public health innovation has been most needed in the counties of Genesee and Orleans.
