Making Community Connections through Partnerships and Communication

- In 2022, 211 Helpline managed nearly 55,000 contacts
- Community needs include food help, housing issues and utility help, mental health support, health insurance assistance, finding COVID-19 vaccination sites, substance use disorder support, and help with transportation
- Help with transportation was identified nearly 1,500 times and help with food related needs over 8,000 times

Social Determinants of Health (SDOH)

2022 Steuben County Office for the Aging Needs Assessment reports that 86% respondents replied the need for help with transportation to appointments as somew hat to very important

Research estimates show over six million people across the US delaying or missing medical care due to transportation insecurity

Missed heath care appointments increases complications of chronic illness, increases hospital readmissions, undermines the opportunity for diagnostic testing and early detection

2018 My Health Story survey completed by Common Ground reported the top barrier to healthy food is that it's too expensive

Poor economic conditions and lack of access to public transportation within rural communities are know n barriers to food access

Obesity and food insecurity are directly related to long term health complications

Coordinated Transportation

Removing Barriers and Increasing Capacity

Providing transportation to elderly and disabled residents in need to non-emergency medical appointments, pharmacies, grocery stores, food pantries and other health and human service agencies, and substance use disorder treatment and recovery services.
