Amy Fleischauer, LMSW is a nationally recognized subject matter expert on human trafficking, domestic violence, and trauma-informed care. She currently works as a trainer/coach at the University at Buffalo's Institute on Trauma and Trauma-Informed Care and as a consultant/subject matter expert with the Howard G. Buffett Foundation, supporting multi-disciplinary teams across the country working to address human trafficking within their communities.

Ms. Fleischauer spent seventeen years as the Director of Survivor Support Services at the International Institute of Buffalo (IIB) supervising a team of case managers and advocates working with nearly 800 survivors annually. She is an active member of the New York Anti-Trafficking Network and serves as a subject matter expert for Freedom Network USA, Aequitas, and International Association of the Chiefs of Police. She is currently working on several state and federal level human trafficking cases as an expert witness.

Ms. Fleischauer has a master's degree in social work from Columbia University and a certificate in Trauma Counseling from the University of Buffalo.

Human Trafficking: A Crime in our Neighborhoods

Despite the passage of federal anti-trafficking legislation in 2001 and New York becoming one of the first to pass state legislation in 2007, effective and collaborative efforts to address this crime remain in their infancy stages.

This training aims to assist participants in (1) familiarizing and/or re-familiarizing themselves with the definitions, prevalence and dynamics of labor and sex trafficking in New York State; (2) increasing their understanding of the value of vital and diverse partners engaged in an effective multidisciplinary response to this crime; and (3) identifying specific strategies to increase identification of potential victims through their work, while providing services to those vulnerable to exploitation.
